Alcove: a small opening or section of a room set back from the rest of it. **Amort**: being close to death. **Caulky**: Caulk is used to fill in a gap, made of tarred fiber such as hemp. Ceaseless: constant and unending. **Cellar**: a room below ground used for storage, like a basement. **Cipher**: a person of no importance. Desolation: a state of loneliness or emptiness. **Dreary**: depressing or dull Drowsy: slow in coming. **Enchanted**: having a magical quality. **Exile**: to be removed from one's home. **Exultant**: to be filled with happiness. Flanges: a projecting object used for strength such as a wheel. Gable: section of a building exterior, usually triangular, where two parts of a roof meet. Immense: very larger or great. Integrity: the state of being whole. Interurban line: a type of streetcar or trolley connecting parts of a town. Kernel: the inner or central part. Kinsman: relatives, members of a family group. Livid: very angry. Monotone: unchanging, having the sameness in color. Mottled: having spots or patches of color. Rampart: a wall-like ridge or barrier. Raven: glossy shiny black in color. **Relapsing**: becoming less active. **Rubbish**: trash or waste Sharp-visaged: stylish in appearance. Slate: a stone grayish tile used for roofs.

Sodden: soaked through with water.

Sprawled: spread out over a large area in an untidy or unorganized way

Sultry: damp and sticky, humid.

Swelter: to be uncomfortably hot.

Tarry: covered with tar.

Thicket: tangled like a thick growth of bushes

Turret: a small tower usually at the top or corner of a building.

Typhoid: a serious bacterial infection usually from contaminated food.
